Parking

Follow the signs around the hospital for parking. The parking ramp is a long distance from the Clinic. It is often hard for people with bone problems to walk this distance.

We advise you to come with a friend or family member and be dropped off at the Charlton Avenue entrance or the Emergency entrance. Your friend or family member can then park and meet you in the Clinic.

Research Centre

St. Joseph's is a research centre.

Many new treatments have been found as a result of research here.

The Fracture and Orthopaedic Clinic often has research projects going on.

You may be asked to be in a research study. The study will be explained to you in detail. You will then be asked to agree or refuse to be in the study.

Your care will be the same in the Clinic whether you agree or refuse to be in a study.

Appointments

If you need to cancel or change your appointment call the Clinic as soon as you can. You will be given a new date and time and someone else can be moved into your spot.

What is the Fracture and Orthopaedic Clinic?

In this Clinic we care for people who have:

- bone surgery
- broken bones
- joint disease or arthritis
- pain

When you are here you may have:

- x-rays
- · a cast put on or removed
- a check-up after surgery
- clips or stitches removed
- a dressing change
- · an injection

You may also meet with the osteoporosis coordinator to learn more about healthy bones.

What do I bring?

- Your health card
- If your injury happened at work, bring your WSIB number, the date of your injury and your employer's name

Give your information and x-rays to the receptionist when you check in.

Waiting

The Fracture and Orthopaedic Clinic is made up of many special rooms. There are exam, x-ray, treatment and casting rooms. You may see other people in the waiting room go into a room before you. However, you are called in as soon as the correct room is ready for you.

This is a very busy clinic. Please be prepared to wait to see your health care provider.
